GREYSTONE VILLAGE HOA BOARD

Since our last newsletter, the Greystone Village Homeowners Association Board has met once, on Tuesday, May 21, at 7pm.

At that meeting the Sign Committee presented the design of the new Greystone Village sign to be built on the south side of Sawmill Road, just east of Creedmoor Road. Crescent Bank, the new bank at the intersection of Creedmoor and Sawmill roads, offered to replace and relocate the sign at that intersection. After discussion, the design was approved with the request that it have no electrical service and that its landscaping service continue.

The Lakes and Grounds Committee recommended that the contract with M&M Landscaping be renewed. A motion for renewal was made and passed.

The Communications Committee said that the board member who edits the Greystone newsletter and maintains the Web site will be moving soon. The board is seeking volunteers to take on one or both of these tasks. Interested homeowners should contact a board member or call Matoka Snuggs at Charleston Management. The Recreation Committee announced that the pool opened on schedule. The dates for swim meets and team trials were given in the March newsletter and are posted on the Web site. Plans have also been made for the Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Labor Day barbecues at the pool. All Greystone homeowners can attend, and you can find more information about them in this newsletter. Homeowners are also reminded that every Greystone homeowner is entitled to three free passes to the Greystone Swim Club each summer, in addition to the three holiday celebrations. To obtain your free passes, go to the pool and ask for the manager or assistant manager; they can supply you with your free passes. The Greystone Village Board of Directors meets every two months, on the third Thursday of the month at Coldwell Banker Advantage, 6008 Creedmoor Road. Homeowners are welcome to attend.

PET PROBLEMS (the laws are for everyone)

There are people who walk their dogs around our lakes who apparently don't know that Raleigh has leash laws, or don't understand or don't care that the laws apply to them. This usually doesn't cause problems, but it can. Dogs can cause problems. That is why the city has laws.

Recently, a couple walking their dog on Greystone Lake said that they had two bad incidents. In the first, their leashed dog was jumped on and bitten by a dog that was off its leash. In the second, a dog off its leash ran up to their dog, and when they told its owner that keeping dogs on a leash was the law, they said that the owner threatened them with a fight. That sort of behavior is out of line and can mar the community for everyone.

To read the Raleigh leash law, go to www.raleighnc.gov, then search on "leash law." That will take you to the page that clearly states that all animals must be restrained and are not permitted to run at large.

Raleigh's pet "pooper scooper" laws are on the same Web page, so take a moment to read those, too. It states that you must always pick up your pet's feces and dispose of it properly.

SUMMER SAFETY AT THE BEACH

June is a time when many people make vacations trip to the ocean, and June 7 - 13 was "Rip Current Awareness Week." However, rip currents are something we should always stay aware of when visiting the ocean.

Rip currents are powerful currents of water that move away from the shore through channels in the sandbars. The outward flow of water is much too strong to swim against, making them very dangerous for visitors to the beach. Note that they are not to be confused with undertow, which is caused by steep declines in the shoreline.

Rip currents are more likely to occur with onshore winds and high surf conditions, at low tides, and near jetties or piers. They can be identified by churning water moving away from shore, water that is noticeably different in color, and areas that seem to be sustained calm areas in the surf.

It's best to swim where there are lifeguards or warning flags. If you get caught in a rip tide, you are advised to swim diagonally or parallel to the shore until you break out of it. Even wading in shallow water with a rip current can be dangerous.

THE NEW GREYSTONE TENNIS PROGRAM

Summer is here and tennis is picking up. Greystone has many programs available for adults and children alike.

Haven't played in a while? Ever? Beginner's clinics are going strong. You can join them on Thursdays at 6pm or Saturdays at 9:30am to learn the game. They also have a Cardio clinic that will get your heart beating on Thursdays at 7pm. All clinics are \$12 per hour.

Friday evenings they host a Free Doubles social from 7-9pm. Please e-mail Chris at greystonetennis@gmail.com to sign up one week in advance. It will be available for the first 16 people to sign up.

Lots of options are available for Juniors this summer. Greystone will have a Bronze, Silver and Gold team. The Bronze Team will practice on Mondays at 9am and hold matches on Wednesday mornings. Silver will practice Mondays at 10am with matches on Thursday mornings, and Gold will practice at 11am on Monday, with matches on Friday mornings. There's still time to sign up, so please let Chris know.

Tennis camps are almost in full swing, with clinics on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Camps last one hour each day per group. Class times are below:

- 1pm - Young 'uns
 - 2pm - 7-10 Year-olds
 - 3pm - 11-14 Year-olds
 - 4pm - High School
- Camps are \$36/week or \$9 per day.

A new addition to the Greystone tennis program is the court scheduler. Its purpose is to make court reservations easier, so nobody worries if a court will be available when they want to play.

The court scheduler is located just inside the gate to Courts 1 & 2. These are the rules:

1. People who sign up for a court will take precedence over those who just show up and start playing. If you begin playing on Court One at 9:30am and someone has reserved it for 10am, you may play there for 30 minutes, then you must give up the court at 10am.
2. Courts are signed up in 1.5 hour time blocks. PLEASE DO NOT DOUBLE BOOK. Double-booking is when you sign up for a 1.5 hour block and your hitting partner signs up for another 1.5 hour block immediately before or after yours.
3. Courts may be reserved up to two weeks in advance.
4. Lessons and clinics take precedence over regular hitting.
5. Note when clinics and privates are held. If you would rather not hit next to a lesson, take note of Chris' schedule.
6. A court is considered "Fair Game" if you don't show up within 15 minutes of your scheduled playing time. If you show up at 9:25am for a 9am court reservation, you may lose the court to players who were waiting for it. Be respectful of others' time and please respect this rule.
7. If a group would like to reserve courts for a team match, contact Chris and he will lock down the times.

RECYCLE PLASTIC BOTTLES: A NEW LAW

A new state law bans plastic bottles from trash cans, beginning October 1, 2009. The law is meant to encourage people to recycle plastic bottles. Since 1991 it has been illegal to put aluminum cans in the trash.

Currently, the average Raleigh resident recycles 321 pounds each year. The goal of Raleigh's Solid Waste Department is to increase that number to 451 pounds per year by 2012, and the ban on placing plastic bottles in the trash will help.

In addition to plastic bottles, Raleigh's curbside recycling program collects:

- Newspapers and all inserts
- Magazines and catalogs
- White paper, including junk mail
- Corrugated cardboard
- Paperboard, chipboard and paper tubes
- Steel food cans
- Aluminum beverage cans
- Aluminum foil and trays that are free of food debris
- Plastic beverage rings
- Glass food and beverage containers
- Gable top cartons, and
- Aseptic (drink) boxes

These items, plus ink jet and toner cartridges and cell phones without accessories --- can also be taken to any of the City's seven recycling drop-off centers.
